Just a few edits. <p>Reduction in Grant Funds:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Grant had required an internal evaluation be done, which caused a reduction in the amount allotted to be requested. <p>Important Deadline:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The request needs to be turn in by January 31st so that there is a quick turn around with getting counties their funds. The sooner the request is turned in the faster counties will get the money and be able to use for their CAP month actives. Request after January will be allowed but the money won't be guaranteed to get to counties in time for CAP month. More specifics are needed on what the money can be used on. 		CAPC: Mike will look to see if counties are allowed to use Grant money for food during training, or Promotional supplies (mugs, shirts, activity supplies) for separate events throughout the month.

<p>V. MCART-Best Practices</p>	<p>Yolo County MCART training PowerPoint:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Yolo County shared there MCART training PowerPoint and everyone should add it to their MCART Binder from Sacramento. Yolo County's Training is a great starting template it has the main basic information needed. <p>Highlight:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The presentation stated that any Mandated Reporter is responsible to report. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Staff shouldn't be only relaying on supervisors to make reports when needed. As well supervisors are not allowed to discourage employees from reporting. Sacramento's' training is built in a 3hr training, 2hr training, 1 1/2hr training. Yolo Counties presentation is 1 ½ hr. training. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Sacramento county as well have a 6 hr. training for AmeriCorps members. The training has self-care activities into the presentation training. When the 1 1/2hr. training is given a lot of data and information is simplified and cut down. It's usually given as a refresher for people who have gotten the training multiple times. <p>Additions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When creating a template, leave a place holder for county specific data (people can hide it if they don't want to use it). CSEC was added as an additional training due to the fact that people had so many questions that it would take 45 minutes longer during the presentation. 		<p>Review Yolo County's MCART PowerPoint and make suggestions of what she be added or expanded on.</p>
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- Added in the presentation a slide to go over the reporting form.
 - Need to show where to find the form, how to fill out the form, and what is most important to be filled out.
 - Needed information on form often left out is Contact Information, who the perpetrator was.
 - The form should be shown even in the refresher training.
- There should to be a slide added for the importance of writing a report.
- Counties have tried to adapt the reporting structure by putting it online, However the form is the same throughout the state.
- Slides should be added to make sure that everyone is interacting and having conversations.
 - It doesn't have to be activities but conversation starters.
 - Add in questions throughout the presentation.
 - Ask people if they have question, concerns, or scenarios.
 - This could be a great place to have participants share times they might have hesitated to make a report or questioning scenarios that they weren't sure of.
- Participants would use this time as a well to get understanding and confirmation on their ideas and steps.
- Touching on the fact that there shouldn't be a fear of repercussions and its okay to report even if they think they might be wrong.
