III. Target Audience/ Strategic Plan Development	<p><i>Discussion: The group reviewed the data on opioid use in each of the Counties. Discussion regarding the data and the current status of the issue in each County per the perception of the members in attendance. Several questions arose in regards to the data presented.</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> What other data do we want/need? Did the data include State Prison data that could skew the county data? Was there a split of who and what the data was referring to? (Old vs. Young, Legal vs. Illegal, etc.) Will there be a downturn in opioid use now that Marijuana has been legalized for medical use? Are there CPS stats on this? And who else in the state is tracking these #s? Impact on adolescents (12-17 years)? What do you do w/ leftover meds? What is the age of people who use? Die? What is the \$ cost of the drug (Heroin/Prescription) <p><i>The discussion culminated with a refocusing on the issue of prevention rather than on the data. The group agreed that the data was sufficient to identify a problem that we could focus prevention efforts on. Several Counties then shared their current programs that they were running that spoke to the issue.</i></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Nevada County talked about their “Drug Free Nevada County Program” which has been in place for several years, is grant funded, and is a collaboration of several County agencies including law enforcement, public schools, social service organizations, youth representatives, residents, and local businesses. Program included 24/7 prescription/ drug take back sites, education efforts, and services. El Dorado County spoke about their “Drug Free Coalition” which was grant funded. This program includes a school based education / prevention program and a community focus on ACES. Includes 	<p><u>Target Audience:</u> Parents of children Prenatal – age 5</p> <p><u>Mitigating factor:</u> AOD/Substance Abuse</p> <p><u>Protective Factor Focus:</u> Knowledge of Child Development</p>



Discussion: The group decided on the following items as a response to how we would work together to mitigate the issue and, simultaneously, focus on child abuse reduction:

1. Flyer or informational card to be developed to encompass information on the pathway to illegal drug use. Card to have focus on opioid, marijuana, alcohol, and other substances as pathway to addiction and illegal use. This was the primary product that the group agreed to use in the outreach and education of parents and the community at large to mitigate this factor.
2. The group also agreed that a Tool Kit should be developed for the Partnership including a road map for Counties to develop strong County coalitions in response to the issue of drug / alcohol abuse, a menu of activities that a county can engage in to bring awareness to the community, and some information about appropriate and effective messaging for a campaign like this.
